# COMMEMORATIVE SERVICES COMMITTEE REPORT

Although allegedly the quiet time of the Commemorative year there has been significant activity in the Services Committee over the Xmas period, caused by the innovative idea by our new President to hold "a recognition service" for those who served in the ADF in the last 50 years. This transcribed into a commemorative service on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> February at the "Forts", followed by a function at the RSL.

Both were very successful with over 100 attending the service & 70+ at the function. The service was specifically designed to be low key as many attending are not regular attendees at formal events and the intent was to reach out to them, making them feel comfortable at "their own service". It worked! I acknowledge the work done by committee members before, during and after the service with most having dual roles with one at the service and another one at the function. As such it was a tired but happy group late on Sunday afternoon.

There has been significant interest displayed in several places around Australia, due to the efforts of Nicole Edmonds our new PR Officer, with many following the progress etc of the buildup to the service and the service itself. As such, the Committee are assessing the situation with the intent of fine tuning and conducting a similar service again in 2025. One obvious enhancement is to hold the service on a Saturday afternoon followed by the function. This in turn will allow attendees from Perth and other localities the opportunity to attend and return to "home base" on Sunday without duly interfering with the normal working week.

At the same time there has been significant preparatory work going on for Anzac Day services and functions for this year. I am extremely pleased to advise that again, Lotteries West have agreed to fund the costs of Anzac Day for all Sub-Branches in WA. In addition, as for the recent service, I will ask the Secretary to email out the RSVP forms for the services on Anzac Day. Please use these to assist me to help you attend services etc. As for normal Anzac Days in Albany we will hold:

The Dawn Service- held on Mt Clarence and live streamed to the AEC and Anzac Peace Park; The Gunfire Breakfast- held at the AEC;

The Troop March to the Service at the Anzac Peace Park- starting at the town hall; The Commemorative Service- at the Anzac Peace Park; and The public function- at the RSL.

Members and their families are encouraged to attend what could be described as "their day".

To streamline services for 2024 we have decided to combine the Boer War service with the Charge of Beersheba Service in late October. This gives us some space in May as we are flat out acquitting grants, running the sponsors night etc. In addition it makes sense as the majority of Australians serving in the Boer War were Mounted Infantry, the forerunners to the Mounted Cavalry of the Light Horse Regiment.

#### **Batons and Bayonets**

These special functions are alive and well, recommencing in February after a "rest period" over January. They now attract a cross section of the Albany and beyond community with the criteria to attend being "like minded" people. They offer good times, good company and if needed "a little business on the side".

#### **Services Liaison**

Although the Xmas and January early February period is supposed to be down time for the "services group" it wasn't the case for the start of 2024 due to the ADF service held on 18<sup>th</sup> of February. Again, I acknowledge the Cando, Will -do and Done attitude of those groups and the individuals involved in whatever way in the support of the RSL with our commemorative services.

The Services would be pretty bland without them!

In summary I would again sum up the efforts (and results) of the new committee as above & beyond and offer my customary **Well Done!**

The Management Committee warmly welcomes Nicole to the Committee as PR Officer for the RSL Albany Sub-Branch.


A painter/decorator by trade, Nicole also has journalistic experience through editorship of a painting/decoration magazine and has an amazing talent for photography.

## RSL ALBANY COMMERATIVE SERVICE HONOURING THOSE WHO SERVED FROM 1973..

The 18th of February saw the RSL Albany Sub Branch hold an inaugural service to commemorate and recognise Australian Defence Force service in the last 50 years. This includes service of any kind in the many areas of conflict such as Somalia, Rwanda, Timor, Iraq, Afghanistan and peace operations such as Bougainville and the Solomons.

In addition, the Service honoured the countless members who served in full time & part time roles within Australia or overseas such as the constant Naval activities with Operation Sovereign border patrols in the near North of the country, the RAAF in Malaysia and other areas of interest including the Army forces at the Airbase Butterworth since 1973 (numbering 20,000+) on three month rotations to provide security to RAAF interests in Malysia.

The service concept is the brain child of RSL Albany Sub Branch President Rex Hendriks and is strongly supported as a way of recognising ADF service of all kinds. It also encourages developing relationship with these "recent" serving members'

The service was held at the 'Forts' and was followed by a barbecue luncheon hosted by RSL Albany at the Clubrooms.

## NATIONAL DAY FOR WAR ANIMALS

## **FEBRUARY 24TH 2024**

## Did You Know?

Each year, on 24 February, is National Day for War Animals in Australia, where we commemorate the deeds and sacrifices of animals in war.

Animals have been put to many uses in war, serving as transport, beasts of burden, messengers, protectors, mascots, and pets. They have played an important part in all wars in which Australians have been involved.

Famously, of 136,000 Australian horses sent to the First World War, only one returned. After General Bridges died in May 1915 from a wound sustained at Gallipoli, his favourite horse, Sandy,

returned to Australia, eventually finding a home at the Australian War Memorial.

While the donkey made famous by Simpson is perhaps the best known example of a beast of burden, mules were in constant demand to carry supplies to the frontline.

The Camel Corps was formed in the early years of the First World War. By late 1917 the Desert Mounted Corps had some 6,000 camels.

The homing ability and navigational skills of carrier pigeons saw them used during the First and Second World Wars. Some were even awarded medals for gallantry.

Working dogs were used by the Royal Australian Engineers in 1918, with sappers handling messenger dogs in the trenches of France. Search dogs were used from 1944 after the raising of the First Australian Dog Platoon. Mine detection and scout dogs were used in Korea and Vietnam and Explosive Detection Dogs were used to counter the threat of improvised explosive devices in Afghanistan.



During the First World War many Australians brought animals from home to the training camps in Egypt. When the war ended they were donated to the Cairo Zoo. As late as the 1950s, it was said to have had the largest collection of Australian native animals outside of Australia. Since then a selection of dogs, cats, goats, possums, rams, eagles, monkeys, turtles and many more have acted as formal (or informal) mascots for Australian units.

### TALES FROM THE METCO FARM...

Most readers will know that the male member of METCO is a skilled craftsman capable of delicate & intricate work to be able to produce useful farm products for METCO Farm.

These are the envy (often) of others!

He also is identified by the name of RCC (Rough Chap Contracting).

Recently there was a requirement to replace an aging 4 inch pencil (grain auger) after a series of disasters around the METCO grain silo.

This included putting a right angle bend in an auger with the tractor forks but no worries as like all good farmers we had a spare (ex-clearing sale) so out with the bent & in with the new!

This was all ok until we had Ben & Erika Henderson's bull (Navman porn star), weighing 1000kg, visiting to assist with the beef Baron of Napier's herd increase & he needed some energy assistance.

I was rather concerned to find him with his head jammed in the chute of the silo but worse still when he pulled the silo off his head & proceeded to march up & down the spare (now in use) auger.

This resulted in another bent tube & a crushed electric motor.

Time for a new one **But** after seeing the prices it was back to the drawing board.

Enter Steve Moir to the rescue with one to borrow almost new (about 70 years ago) along with Steve's unique raising & lowering system, complete with wheels (made from 6kg Gym weights). Now we were right.

All was good until the Electric motor on Steve's auger died. No sweat as in the back shed we had another motor last used on a dam pump by my father > 28 years ago.

Unfortunately after deciding to do some maintenance on Steve's auger before returning it to him we found the base of the tube completed rusted out.

Interestingly back in the day auger tubes were made of rainwater down pipe (4inch) with no spiral stiffeners. At about< 1mm thick welding up was out of the question.

Informing Steve of the bad news, in his typical form, he replied I had forgotten about the auger, it was up to us to bin it or use for spares.

An idea formed of using 4 buggered augers to make one. This required delicate craftmanship!

The first issue was attempting to buy the right size pulley to no avail in Albany.

On the search for a right size one, cousin Ben assisted in the task. Leasing cows at Darryl & Jodie Elsons he saw the same size one in Darryl's laydown /junk area, securely imprisoned by Kikuyu.

After approaching Darryl for assistance & being told help yourself, it was time to break his old auger out of the kike jail, duly done & back to METCO to finally separate parts & look at attempting to make 1 x auger out of the original awesome foursome.

As a result, at the mere cost of \$25 for a pulley for the refurbished (from bits of E motor) & probably \$25 for consumables this would be seen as a masterpiece & without the price tag of several thousand dollars for a new one.

That is unless you count the probably 100 hrs of labour costs valued at about \$3,000 +

## MEMORABLE MILITARY MOMENTS

"A modern battle plan is like nothing so much as a score for a musical composition, where the various arms and units are the instruments, and the tasks they perform are their respective musical phrases. Each individual unit must make its entry precisely at the proper moment and play its phase in the general harmonv."

"The true role of infantry was not to expend itself upon heroic physical effort, not to wither away under merciless machine-gun fire, not to impale itself on hostile bayonets, but on the contrary, to advance under the maximum possible protection of the maximum possible array of mechanical resources, in the form of guns, machine-guns, tanks, mortars and aeroplanes; to advance with as little impediment as possible; to be relieved as far as possible of the obligation to fight their way forward."

#### General Sir John Monash

Monash's Battle of Hamel, where he commanded the Australian Corps was a masterpiece of Combined Arms and the first time that the Australian Army had been able to decisively generate the combined arms effect. He had been promoted to LT GEN on the 1st of June.

### Special Orders to No 1 Section 13/3/18

..........

- 1. This position will be held, and the section will remain here until relieved.
- 2. The enemy cannot be allowed to interfere with this programme.
- 3. If the section cannot remain here alive, it will remain here dead, but in any case, it will remain here.
- 4. Should any man, through shell shock or other cause, attempt to surrender, he will remain here dead.
- 5. Should all guns be blown out, the section will use Mills grenades, and other novelties. Finally, the position, as stated, will be held.
